# History 414 Themes

- **This course examines the major issues and themes in the formation of a national identity in the years between 1815 and 1860. These are some of the questions we will explore:**
- **How did the struggles for political and economic equality by women, enslaved people, indigenous people, and immigrants shape public and private definitions of citizenship?**
- **How did urbanization, Indian removal, and westward expansion transform the political and economic lives of ordinary Americans?**
- **How did the growth of national markets and transportation networks help to unite and divide the Union?**
- **How did social and moral reform movements contribute to the growth of sectionalism?**
- **How did the growing tensions about the institution of slavery and its expansion in the West precipitate the social and political crises of the 1850s?**

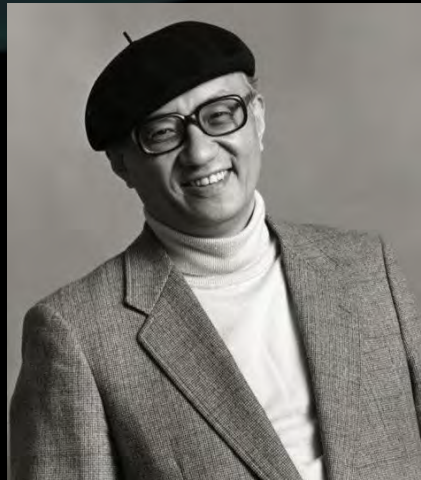
