

CHICAGO STYLE: AUTHOR-DATE

The Chicago Manual of Style's Author-Date system requires two elements to document sources in a paper: in-text citations and a references page.

HOW TO WRITE IN-TEXT CITATIONS

In-text citations should include the author's last name and the year of publication in parentheses next to the quoted or paraphrased material.

Paraphrased & Quoted Examples

Make sure to include the page number separated by a comma.

There is some flexibility in where the citation appears:

Direct quote: The citation can appear after the author is mentioned or at the end of the quote.

- Smith (2015, 50) stated that "illegal waste disposal led to the water contamination."
- Smith stated that "illegal waste disposal led to the water contamination" (2010, 50).

Paraphrased material: The citation can be placed after the author is mentioned or, if the author is not mentioned, with their name at the end of the sentence.

- Sokolowski (2008, 355) asserts that philosophers such as Plato and Aristotle...
- Philosophers such as Plato and Aristotle... (Sokolowski 2008, 355).

Using the Same Source Multiple Times

When the same source is used multiple times in a paragraph, only the first in-text citation of the paragraph needs to have the author's last name and date. Subsequent citations require only the page number.

• Smith (2015, 50) stated that "illegal waste disposal led to the water contamination." This kind of contamination has "led to various economic disasters like famine" (67).

No Known Date

For print materials, in the case of a source with no publication date, n.d. can be used in place of a year.

• (Yale University, n.d.)

For online materials, use the date that the material was accessed:

HOW TO WRITE A REFERENCE PAGE

The page on which you fully list your sources should come at the end of the document and should be titled "References." Do not bold, italicize, or use quotation marks around this title. Entries on the References page should be alphabetized and single-spaced, with an extra space between them. Note that the year of publication comes directly after the Author's name in Reference list entries. Examples of what a Chicago style References page looks like can be found online.
