Course Description

CHI 214 covers the second part of Integrated Chinese, Level I. Part II. It starts from Lesson 16 and ends with Lesson 20. The functional-based lessons continue to build up your competency in Chinese and prepare you to communicate effectively in additional real-life situations. To achieve maximum result, you are expected to actively participate in all learning activities such as listening, speaking, reading and writing. Completion of this course will not only increase your proficiency in the Chinese language, but also enrich your knowledge about the Chinese culture.

Learning Outcomes

CHI 214 will contribute to the attainment of the University Undergraduate Learning Outcomes (UULOs) and the Department of World Languages and Cultures (WLC) Student Learning Outcomes in the areas of communication, cultures, connections, comparisons, and communities. On satisfying the requirements for this course, students are expected to be at the Intermediate Mid-level on the ACTFL (American Council for the Teaching of Foreign Languages) scale. More specifically, students will:

- Comprehend dialogues and passages read or spoken by Chinese natives at normal speed with familiar vocabulary.
- Discuss more topics of general interest and daily routines (e.g., dating, renting an apartment, sports, travel, transportation, etc.).
- Comprehend short written dialogues and reading passages with familiar vocabulary.
- Improve accuracy and fluency of pronunciation, improve proficiency of writing, and be able to write longer narratives.

Course Outline

We will complete the five lessons on November 23, 2021. Daily lesson plans are subject to adjustments depending on how well and how fast you master the material being taught. Extra learning material may be presented when necessary.

Final Grades

Final grades will consist of the following categories: attendance (10%); participa-

tion (10%); homework assignments (20%); unit quizzes (10%); midterm examination (15%); final examination (25%) and a final presentation (10%).

Attendance

It is imperative that everyone attend all classes on time. If you need to be absent to observe religious holidays, please notify me no later than Sep 7, 2021. Written notes from credible sources are accepted for excusable absences. Please be aware that two absences without compelling reasons will lead to deduction of half a letter grade from your final grade.

Participation

Active participation is one of the key factors in improving language skills and achieving desirable outcomes. You are encouraged to get involved in all forms of classroom learning activities. Lack of participation in independent, group and class work will affect your final grade.

Homework

All homework assignments must be done independently. You are required to hand in your homework on due dates specified on the class schedule. You will get 90% of credits for late but completed assignments. You will get full credit for make-up homework due to illnesses or other emergent situations. You are responsible for providing written proof of your emergencies from credible sources. Incomplete assignments will affect your final grade.

UNLV Sponsored Activity

Students who represent UNLV at any official extracurricular activity shall have the opportunity to make up assignments, but the student must provide official written notification to the instructor *no less than one week prior to the first class to be missed*.

Quizzes and Examinations:

There will be ungraded in-class quizzes for practice purposes throughout the semester. There will be a unit quiz upon completion of each lesson. All unit quizzes will be graded. The quizzes are designed to evaluate how well you have mastered the material and create smooth transitions to new material. Make up quizzes and assignments are allowed for those with justifiable absences such as illnesses, accidents, family emergencies and religious observances. One midterm examination and one final examination will be given during the semester. Midterm examination is scheduled on October 12, 2021. Final examination will take place on December 7, 2021. Everyone is expected to be punctual for all the quizzes and examinations

Oral Presentations

You will work in pairs for oral presentations on December 2, 2021. Select a topic about which you feel confident and comfortable to talk in front of the class. You

are welcome to discuss your script with me one week in advance. A solo presentation will need to last two minutes or more and a pair presentation will need to last more than four minutes.

Classroom Rules

Mutual respect between students and instructors can create a favorable classroom environment. Behaviors such as talking, eating and drinking are considered disrespectful and not allowed during class. It is important that you refrain from using computers, cell phones and other communication devices during class. Please do not record any classroom lectures without my consent. Those who bring children to class should make sure that no disruptions occur throughout the entire class period.

Auditing a Course

Auditing a course allows a student to continue attending the lectures and/or laboratories and discussion sessions associated with the course, but the student will not earn a grade for any component of the course. Students who audit a course receive the same educational experience as students taking the course for a grade, but will be excused from exams, assessments, and other evaluative measures that serve the primary purpose of assigning a grade.

Classroom Conduct

Students have a responsibility to conduct themselves in class and in the libraries in ways that do not interfere with the rights of other students to learn, or of instructors to teach. Use of devices such as cellular phones and pagers, or other potentially disruptive activities are only permitted with the prior explicit consent of the instructor. Students are specifically prohibited to record classes without instructor authorization, including online/remote classes (either audio only, or video and audio). The instructor may rescind permission at any time during the class. If a student does not comply with established requirements or obstructs the functioning of the class, the instructor may initiate an administrative withdrawal of the student from the course.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic forced some instruction to be delivered remotely starting in Spring 2020, numerous students have asked instructors to record their synchronous classes, so that they can access them at their convenience. Instructors who agree to record their classes (audio only, or video and audio) should inform students in advance. Recorded lectures may not be broadly released to anyone, but made available exclusively to those students enrolled in the class during the particular academic term. Recorded lectures must be stored securely, and are subject to the Nevada System of Higher Education's Records Retention Policy, meaning that the recordings can only be deleted 120 days after the end of class (i.e., after grades are posted). Once this requirement is met, the recordings should be deleted. Class recordings are protected from disclosure, as they are deemed part of an educational record under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

Identity Verification in Online Courses

All UNLV students must use their Campus-issued ACE ID and password to log in to WebCampus-Canvas.

Incomplete Grades

The grade of "I" (Incomplete) may be granted when a student has satisfactorily completed three-fourths of course work for that semester/session, but cannot complete the last part of the course for reason(s) beyond the student's control and acceptable to the instructor, and the instructor believes that the student can finish the course without repeating it. For undergraduate courses, the incomplete work must be made up before the end of the following regular semester. Graduate students receiving "I" grades in 500-, 600-, or 700-level courses have up to one calendar year to complete the work, at the discretion of the instructor. If course requirements are not completed within the period indicated, a grade of "F" will be recorded, and the student's GPA will be adjusted accordingly. Students who are fulfilling an Incomplete grade do not register for the course, but make individual arrangements with the instructor who assigned the "I" grade.

Missed Classwork

Any student missing class, quizzes, examinations, or any other class or laboratory work because of observance of religious holidays will be given an opportunity during that semester to make up the missed work. The make-up opportunity will apply to the religious holiday absence only. It is the responsibility of the student to notify the instructor within the first 14 calendar days of the course for Fall and Spring courses (except for modular courses), or within the first 7 calendar days of the course for Summer and modular courses, of their intention to participate in religious holidays which do not fall on state holidays or periods of class recess. In accordance with the policy approved by the Faculty Senate regarding missed class time and assignments, students who represent UNLV in any official extracurricular activity will also have the opportunity to make up assignments, provided that the student submits official written notification to the instructor no less than one week prior to the missed class(es).

The spirit and intent of the policy for missed classwork is to offer fair and equitable assessment opportunities to all students, including those representing the University in extracurricular activities. Instructors should consider, for example, that in courses which offer a "Drop one" option for the lowest assignment, quiz, or exam, assigning the student a grade of zero for an excused absence for extracurricular activity is both contrary to the intent of the Faculty Senate's policy, and an infringement on the student's right to complete all work for the course.

This policy will not apply in the event that completing the assignment or administering the examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship on the instructor or the University that could be reasonably avoided. There should be a good faith effort by both the instructor and the student to agree to a reasonable resolution. When disagreements regarding this policy arise, decisions can be appealed to the Department Chair/School Director, College/School Dean, and/or the Faculty Senate Academic Standards Committee.

For purposes of definition, extracurricular activities may include, but are not limited to academic recruitment activities, competitive intercollegiate athletics, fine arts activities, liberal arts competitions, science and engineering competitions, and any other event or activity sanctioned by a College/School Dean, and/or by the Executive Vice President and Provost.

Rebelmail
