FREN 402: Advanced French Composition & Conversation II

Course Description

FREN 402 is a 3-credit advanced stylistics class with emphasis on writing, vocabulary building, rhetorical figures and analysis of texts. The content is thematically organized around contemporary issues and events. Throughout this course, learners will 1) enhance their understanding of contemporary French and Francophone cultures; 2) hone their presentational, interpretive, and interpretived skills in French; 3) participate in activities designed to cultivate critical thinking. Class is conducted entirely in French. All assignments are to be completed in French. This course fulfills the UNLV International Core Requirement. Prerequisites: FREN 301, 302 or equivalent.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course:

- Learners will be able to demonstrate effective command of the French language using various registers, turns of phrase, and context-specific vocabulary;

- Learners will be able to engage critically with a variety of texts in French, distinguish nuances, and express subtle nuances in their analysis;

- Learners will have a wider and deeper understanding of contemporary issues related to the French and Francophone world.

Course Expectations

a) Classroom policies

- The use of electronic devices is only permitted at the discretion of the instructor.
- No food allowed in classroom.
- Students are expected to behave respectfully. The Classroom Conduct policy at UNLV states that "Students have a responsibility to conduct themselves in class...in ways which do not interfere with the right of other students to learn or of instructors to teach." Non-compliant students will be referred to the Student Code Office. They may be dropped administratively.

b) Presence & Make-up policies

After eight unexcused absences, students may be dropped administratively. Students who represent UNLV at any official extracurricular activity shall have the opportunity to make up assignments, but the student must provide official written notification to the instructor no less than one week prior to the missed class(es). Assignments will only be permitted to be made-up or rescheduled for extraordinary circumstances (e.g. jury duty) for which formal original documentation will need to be furnished. *This does not include parking difficulties, halted traffic, family reunions, work obligations, travel plans, etc.* Be advised you will not be given the opportunity to make-up an assessment if you do not contact your instructor prior to the graded assessment being returned to the class. Official and original documentation must be provided the day you return from the absence(s). Make-up opportunities are contingent upon timely receipt of proper documentation.

c) <u>Preparation & Participation</u>: This course is intellectually challenging and requires a gradual buildup of skills and knowledge, which is difficult to achieve without regular study and practice.

To succeed in this course, you should prepare no less than 4 hours for every class meeting. You are expected to do the assigned homework so that you can participate actively in all class activities, group work, etc. Classroom time is for clarification rather than for presentation of the material. A special emphasis will be put on speaking. Factors that will influence your participation grade are the following:

- Your active participation in group discussions;
- Your ability to answer questions from the professor regarding the material;
- The depth and breadth of your interpretation, analysis and treatment of the material.
- d) <u>Testing</u>: There will be four graded assignments in class during the semester in the form of "préparation au DALF C1". The <u>DALF</u> (Diplôme Approfondi de Langue Française) is a French diploma administered by the <u>CIEP</u> at the C1 and C2 levels. The DALF evaluates all four skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing). In the context of this course, each "préparation" will focus on one or more of these skills. More details about these assignments will be given in class.
- e) <u>Final exam</u>: the final exam is comprehensive in nature and will consist of two parts: a written comprehension of a text with questions, and an essay portion on a topic linked to the ones discussed in class. More details about the final exam will be given in class.
